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news from the county commissioner

We are now well into the Centenary Year and already we are seeing an increase in the numbers of young people and adults looking to join us. I suspect, however, this is the 'calm before the storm'. Many of you may have seen or heard the recent programmes on television and radio. These initial programmes focus firmly on the history but as we reach Founders Day there will be a change to focus on the modern movement.

This starts with Blue Peter on 20 February and future items will clearly be focused on the modern movement and what it can offer both young people and adults. Our own media manager has been very active and we are obtaining coverage at a level not seen for many years. We are increasing the number of Young Spokespersons in the County, taking part in radio programmes and interviews all the time, highlighting the Fun and Adventure which we offer and all this will attract young people, that I have no doubt.

The County Camp will soon be upon us and this will be another opportunity for us to celebrate what the movement can offer. Many people are putting great effort into this event and it will be a weekend to remember and to take part in a wide range of new activities as well as mix with other members from across the County. I hope that I will have the opportunity to meet with you and your group at this event.

I am also aware of the number of activities being planned across the year, Founder Day Services, Sunrise Events, amongst others. Biggleswade have also managed to book the National Mobile Display Unit, the first time it will have been deployed in the County.

The main issue will of course be the appointment of more adults to allow us to meet the extra numbers looking to join us. I have asked the DCs to work in their Districts to look at priority areas and to agree with groups where resources need to be deployed so that this can be used to progress the employment of a full time worker who can focus on Retention and Recruitment of adults. Please make your views known but also be prepared to take a wider view when agreeing which areas should be tackled first.

Some of you will be aware of the six stage recruitment process for adults. If not speak to your DC as this is a proven technique for recruiting adults and we can arrange briefing sessions.

As always my thanks for all that you do for the movement.

Congratulations go to Richard Merryweather – GSL Brickhill Group Bedford, his contribution to the community has been recognised by the local council.

Nigel Taylor has also obtained a Winston Churchill Travel Sponsorship; this award will give Nigel an opportunity to seek out new ideas that can help scouting develop.

Enjoy 2007 and the events and let's rise to the challenge to continue to grow our sections and groups to meet the demand the year will bring.

"GET TOGETHER" PROGRAMME

Many thanks to the leaders who came along to Bromham on Saturday 13th January to take part in this training programme written by a team from Mencap. Robert and Garry told us how Mencap has changed and that their organization supports all young people with different learning difficulties. They are always happy to give any advice that we may find helpful.

I am sure that many would agree that it was interesting to look at young people with special needs from a different point of view and that "Get Together", as with all scouting training modules, is a useful way of sharing views and ideas so that we can learn from one another. As always I am pleased to find that as an organization, we are inclusive and take care to invite young people with special needs to join us but hopefully we took home some ideas that would work well at any time.

More time and thought taken when introducing any young person to a group could help. A useful tip that came from the course is to ask your present members to introduce the new members to the section.

Perhaps the exercise below may help:

- Ask the group to split into pairs A and B
- Ask the young people to find out about each other eg name, school, brothers and sisters, favourite pop group, favourite food, what they dislike most. (a prompt list may be useful and also age appropriate)
- Bring the group into a circle and then go around the group and get A to introduce B and then B to introduce A

I always found this helped me remember names too!

I have had some requests from the Special Needs Team at Gilwell recently who have been looking for people to take part in different projects. If you know of anyone who would be happy to take part in showing how we include members with needs. Recent requests were for a Young Leader to take part in producing a DVD on volunteering and a deaf person to take part in the See Hear Programme on BBC. Unfortunately the timing of these requests is always last minute but I would be happy to encourage anyone who felt they wanted to share their experiences. With this in mind, please e-mail me with the names of anyone who may be interested in doing this kind of publicity for Scouting.

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Scouts take a 2000 Year walk for their Centenary



To mark our centenary the 7th Someries Air Scout Troop are planning a major fundraising event to take place at the end of May.

Five Scouts aged between 10¹/₂ and 13 years and four leaders are to attempt to walk the Hadrian's Wall National Trail and visit the site of Baden Powell's first official Lookwide Scout camp at Humshaugh.

They are all members of the Maulden Explorer Scout Unit with a range of Scouting skills to their credit. And they are busy practising for their big media event - the Scouts sunrise camp on August 1st when the county's 5,600 Scouts will gather to celebrate the centenary of Scouting.

Sam has just joined the unit after spending four years in the Scouts. He is looking forward to the more advanced activities and the greater responsibility that the Explorers expect. In answer to a question about girls in Scouts he said, "We just muck in together. They do everything the boys do and sometimes better. We have had girls in Scouts for years."

The three girls, Caitlin, Stephanie and Emily have been to winter camps and cope with all the mud, cold and wet that it brings. They know how to keep

hypothermia at bay and tackle all the hard tasks with gusto. Speaking for the rest, Stephanie said, "We like the Scouts because they have many more adventurous activities. We can build

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Maulden Scout Leader And Chaplain Hosted Baden-Powell Memorial Service in Westminster Abbey

Two Young Scouts Led The Service With A Superb Hour Long Oration

The Revd Richard Winslade, rector of St Mary's Church in Maulden, has just made Scouting history. On Saturday 24th February he changed from his Scout uniform into church minister robes to conduct a major national memorial service in Westminster Abbey. Attended by over 1000 Scouts and Guides, including Chief Scout Peter Duncan and Chief Guide Liz Burnley, the service commemorated the 150th birthday of Robert Baden-Powell and the centenary of the Scout Movement he founded in 1907. Also attending were Baden-Powell's great grandchildren specially flown over from Australia for the event. Richard will go down in the county's record books as the first Bedfordshire minister to be given the honour of hosting the Founder's Day National Memorial Service.



But two 12-year old Scouts stole the show with the performance of a lifetime as they faultlessly led the congregation through all the intricate details of the presentation. Naomi Winslade and Rachel Leach from the Badgerhill Scout Group in Maulden did not know it but their parents and most of the congregation wiped away many tears of pride as they went through their confident performance. At the end of the service they led the congregation as the flags were blessed and the Scouts and Guides renewed their promises.



Many friends and colleagues from Bedfordshire Scouts made the trip to London on Saturday to give Richard and the youngsters moral support. They included Jamboree Leader Gerry Pope from Biggleswade, County Chairman Paul Ibbotson from Arlesey, District Commissioner Nigel Taylor from Flitwick and a huge contingent of Scouts from the Badgerhill Scout Group in Maulden that he used to run.

For the service, Richard took as his theme the past, present and the future of Scouting. He said, "It's a time to remember our roots and what we have done and to build on all these efforts for whatever the future brings." His address was all about sharing. Just to show what sharing was all about he threw handfuls of sweets into the congregation and asked his disciples (12 Cub Scouts and 12 Brownie Guides) to share them around. Westminster Abbey had seen nothing like it!



After the event Nigel Taylor said, "I sat in the congregation with considerable pride and a lump in my throat listening to Naomi and Rachel speaking with such confidence to such a huge gathering. They were a credit to Scouting and to themselves." Nigel added, "Richard has now set a precedent at the Abbey by throwing sweets out to the congregation and then encouraging 24 Cubs and Brownies to run amok to share their experiences of Scouting with all the VIPs. I returned home full of enthusiasm and immensely proud."

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adult training

What is a Training Adviser?

The key role of a Training Adviser is to support a learner, usually one new to Scouting, through The Scout Association's Adult Training Scheme. You will supervise a learner up to the award of the Wood Badge to ensure they have the skills, knowledge and attitudes they need to be effective in their Scouting role.

A Training Adviser therefore will usually be someone with Scouting experience who is familiar with The Scout Association in general, its method of training and its Values, Purpose and Method.

What does a Training Adviser do?

A Training Adviser performs a number of tasks:

- meet learners joining the training scheme and explain the scheme to them
- help each learner put together a Personal Learning Plan
- provide support to the learner as required
- review their progress with them on a regular basis
- decide what modules they have satisfactorily completed
- recommend the award of the Wood Badge to the Training Manager.

If helping other leaders by sharing your Scouting knowledge and experience appeals to you then why not consider being a Training Adviser.
